"Ed Says"

Corvairs that have regularly lubricated and well taken care of normally have very little problems in the steering and handling department. The fact that the Corvair does not carry a load over the front wheels plays a great part in this. There is one simple part that can deteriate and cause poor handling all of a sudden. which can have you wondering what happened. This is a rubber pitman arm bushing. After 40 some years this will deteriate and cause a lot of play in the steering. Corvair vendors have solved this problem well. A Nylon bushing can be installed easy to replace the worn rubber bushing. This will give back the control and your steering will be like having power steering. Keep in mind that the air pressure should be about 10# less in the front tires than in the rear. 20# in the front and 32# in the rear is about right.

The Worst Corvair Repair

When General Motors quit manufacturing the Corvair in 1969, that instantly made it a "Throw-Away" car. Many Corvairs were driven until they died and a lot of owners felt they were not worth reviving. I had been employed at a local Chevrolet dealer briefly during the spring and summer of 1961. I was given a 1961 Monza 4 Door 3 speed for a demonstrator. It was a fun car to drive and when I left the employ of this dealer, I felt that I'd like to own a Corvair. Later I found a 1960 700 4 door automatic at a reasonable price and purchased it. The automatic would be easy for my wife to learn to drive and would be a great handling car for her. This was our family car for several years.

During the later 60's, I started buying some of these Corvairs that people had given up on. Many had very little wrong with them, Lacking normal maintenance and mechanics that had little or no knowledge of how to work on a Corvair. I was the Tire and Auto Service department manager at a local national retail outlet about the time the Corvair went out of production. My fellow employees thought of me as the "Corvair Nut" and if they spotted a Corvair for sale, they would tell me about it. A fellow employee spotted a Corvair station wagon for sale on his way to work and thought I would be interested. As it was only about a mile from my place of employment, I drove out on my lunch hour to look it over. It was a 1962 Monza Station Wagon with an automatic transmission. The body and interior was in pretty good shape, except the right front was damaged, needing a bumper, headlight rim, and light body work. The windshield was also cracked from the impact. The car had no battery, so I made my usual "Low Ball" offer, \$50.00, and it was accepted. We came back during the week-end to tow it home. The title was signed over and as we were about to leave the previous owner handed me some papers and we were on our way.

At home, I had a better chance to look over my treasure. Inspecting the engine compartment, the first thing I spotted was the right side carburetor had no choke connection. A 1961 Cylinder head had been installed! Oh well, I hadn't expected perfection. A battery was installed and it finally was coaxed to start and run. Run it did, badly. The number one cylinder head gasket was blown. It was than I looked over the papers the previous owner had given me. What I found was a statement from a local independent auto Repair shop for repair work done on the engine of this car to the amount just under \$700.00 WOW!! It should have run like a new Cadillac!! This was not the end, read on. I pulled the head and in doing so, I discovered the rear top stud on the engine block was stripped, the reason for the gasket failure. The stud was replaced using an insert and a proper Cylinder head installed.

Finally it was started and seemed to run fine. Keep reading, it's not over yet. I had only driven it on short trips, no more than 10 miles at a time. I had the occasion to make a 100 mile round-trip and decided to take the wagon. Everything went fine until going up a fairly long steep grade on the free-way about 15 miles from home. The car was losing power and was over-heating. It finally quit running. After allowing it to cool off, it started and I headed back home. Back to the repair statement. One entry – nurilize pistons. Most mechanics know air cooled engines are designed for more piston to cylinder wall clearances than water cooled engines. The piston when warmed up, expanded and seized! This was a repair shop that had a good local reputation, but certainly had no experience in working on Corvairs. I later installed a 1964 110 HP Motor and was able to use the wagon. The winter salt finally got the best of it as it was parted out and junked.

This still is about the way most repair shops still operate when working on your Corvair. You are paying them to learn to work and suffering the consequences when they make this type of expensive mistake. The Head of The Lakes Corvair Cavalry's Mission is to help prevent this from happening to our club members.



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An afternoon in Bovey

Well The Calvary made a trip up to Bovey on Friday March 31st. We went up to help out Ryan with his late 110. It started out as a trip to adjust the carbs and look at the tack. First off was to adjust the valves so we started by removing a valve cover. This is where the fun begins. After removing the cover we see that there is no oil at the rockers. We thought maybe it needed a little more running time so we tried to run it for a short time and still no oil. Now bear in mind there is no mufflers on the car and the manifolds are on backwards so the open manifolds are pointing to the rear of the car. The only thing we could find to get the exhaust extended was a round cardboard tube. We cut it in half and had Art hold on one side and Ed held the other It helped but was still loud.



We then pulled the alternator so we could remove the oil pressure switch. We tried to crank the engine and found no oil pressure. Then we removed the distributor and used a drill to spin the oil pup and a nice flow of oil finally appeared. Now to figure out why we get no oil flow with the distributor installed. I pulled the oil pump to check the ears on the drive end and found everything perfect. SO back together it goes. Again we try the drill motor and have a nice flow of oil. Now we put the distributor back in and try and finally get a flow of

Oil at the oil sending unit hole. Next we start the engine and check at the rocker arms for oil once again and find no flow of oil. Now we are stumped and cold. We decide to pack it up for the day and head for home. We talk about it all the way home and pretty much agree that somewhere the oil passages are blocked. Not long after I arrived home Ryan calls to inform me that he went to town and got some Crankcase oil Cleaner and ran thru it. In no time he had good oil pressure and oil flow everywhere. What a relief!! I told Ryan that now we know what we need we would put some parts together and make a return trip and finish the job, It seemed like it was a wasted day because we didn't get much accomplished but then again I think we saved an engine that had it been run much would have froze up from no oil.



The day was filled with it's usual bantering back and forth, some of which cannot be shared on here LOL. When Lunchtime came we were treated with some Homemade lasagna, salad and brownies. Thank you for that, It was Fantastic. Part 2 of this story will be at a later date when we make the return trip. Thank you Ed Art, and Ryan for another fun day!!!! This is what Corvairing is all about.
